Gussie pursued many interests in her long, event-filled life. She often said she had no one to teach her how to cook so she learned alone; she was a fine cook, very often having used produce from her huge garden. She worked hard on the Clark County farm she and her late husband, **Ivan Voyt**, bought in 1935. Row cropping was exchanged for livestock rearing in the 1950's but the work was no less hard. She was a fine seamstress. She made some clothes for her family and kept the purchased ones in fine repair. She designed and sewed quilt tops then she alone and with others made complete quilts.

Gussie painted pictures. She enjoyed participation in local guild painting sessions and craft sales. Her fine works were enhanced by the custom frames made by her master-carpenter husband. She was a historian. She researched her family history and contributed articles for history magazines. She loved to read. She explored the world through books and magazines.

Gussie is survived by half-sister **Helen Woodson** and sons **John W. Taylor** and **Larry E. Taylor**. Through John and **Jeanne (Wilson) Taylor**, other survivors include granddaughters **JayIn Mitchell** and **Jacynda Smith** and great-grandchildren **Colt, Caleigh James, Cullen** and **Connor**.
